BY-LAWS UPDATE

As a result of the by laws change made last June adding the office of President Elect there are two additional sections which need to be brought into agreement with that addition. We will vote on these at the May meeting.

First:

Article IV Executive Board Section 1:

Change the number of officers required to constitute a quorum from four to five.

Rational: With the addition of the office of President Elect there are eight officers on the Board with the potential of nine when there are two VMGA representatives. In order to have a simple quorum five must be present for any votes.

Second:

Paragraph 2 under Section 1

Wording should be:

The term of office shall be two years with the exception of President and President Elect, who shall serve for one year terms. To ensure Board continuity, three officers are to be elected one year and four the next. President Elect shall be elected annually.

Rational: Adding the wording "President Elect shall be elected annually." brings wording into agreement with action taken previously.

APRIL WILDFLOWER OF THE MONTH

DWARF BLUET

Houstonia pusilla

This tiny annual bluet, with purple-violet flowers no more than $\frac{1}{4}$ inch across, colors fields and roadsides in early spring. Each blossom consists of a narrow tube, ending in 4 petals at right-angles around a central reddish eye. The flowers are borne on stalks up to an inch long, terminally and from the axils of the $\frac{1}{2}$ inch long leaves.

Dwarf Bluet grows in dry soil, often in gravel roadways from Virginia south to Florida and west to South Dakota and Texas. In Virginia, this plant occurs mostly in the Coastal Plain and south-central counties.

Two similar perennial species grow naturally in the Coastal Plain in Virginia: Common Bluet, *Houstonia caerulea* has light blue flowers centered with a yellow eye; and Woodland Bluet, *Houstonia purpurea* – the light blue flowers with a light center cluster at the ends of stems up to 18 inches tall. These two species bloom later than Dwarf Bluet, and are found in woodlands and other moist situations, not roadsides and disturbed soils.

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BARRELS AND BINS OPEN FOR BUSINESS BY DENNIS WOOL



The Barrels and Bins Team is pleased to report that we are open for business and prepared to demonstrate again the utility of recycling products into use in the home garden. Rain barrels remain an item of homeowner interest as water bills continue to rise and the \$25 rebate (limit 4) for residents of James City County is still available. Our team is prepared to demonstrate how the barrels can be decoratively painted or daisy-chained to increase utility. David Sisson has 5 units linked from which he waters his entire garden throughout the season. Barrels are \$65 for the grey and \$50 for the white.

We find a steady increase in interest in our small (35 gal) composter which does not require either a great deal of space or much effort to employ. Thanks to a recent contribution of barrels from Sentara Hospital and the handy work of Eric Bramfitt, the cost of the composter remains at \$65.

Anyone who has tried the concept of container gardening understands why some folks are already picking fresh lettuce and spinach. Strawberries will be on the scene shortly and will be enjoyed over the next several months. The market has come out with a new 14 gallon container that we will be trying this year along with our standard 18 gallon version. Interestingly enough, both containers retail for about the same cost, so our Self Watering Container Kit will be the same for both sizes - \$15.



Barrels and Bins Team have made 3 presentations so far this year with additional opportunities at the Plant Sale and Farmer's Market. If our Team is to have another successful year supporting the budgets of our Master Gardener Projects, we need your help! 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GARDENING TIPS BY AILENE BARTLETT

Given our rollercoaster weather, it's hard to say what to do at this time of year. Of course, you can ALWAYS deadhead, pull weeds, and plan ahead.

You'd best bypass the cool-season plants available at the plant centers - it's going to get too hot for them too soon. Thin the crowded lettuce, carrots, and chard you already planted. Put tall, twiggy branches (pruned from your crape myrtles maybe?) next to the peas to support the branches. If you still have cool season crops, mulch around their bases to keep them cool.

Now's the time to select new azalea and rhododendron bushes while they are in bloom! That way, you can tell if they fit into your color scheme! And add to your garden log, so next year you can see what happened in some of this weird weather. GOOD DIGGING!

Also known as Self Watering Containers, the Grow Box provides a plant environment for gardeners wanting to grow herbs or vegetables without a traditional in ground garden, Using an 18 gal tub and recycled materials, the Box has a 2.5 gal reservoir for water at the bottom, allowing the plant to draw moisture as needed. Filling the accomplished is through reservoir bamboo pipe. The Grow Box/SWC is sold as a kit, just assemble, add potting mix and plants, watch your garden grow.

Master Gardeners promote the concept of Water Wise Gardening using best practice concepts that include the capture of rain water from roof run off. Barrels are easily attached to gutter down spouts or placed in strategic run off areas of non-guttered homes. Rain water (approx. 55 gal) is then stored until needed. An Overflow Pipe directs excess away from the house. Units can be used in single or multiple combinations using brass fittings. Rebates of \$25 are available from the JCSA.

Composting has long been a hallmark of gardening and the focus of recycling green yard/household waste. To assist the urban gardener with this focus. Master produced Gardeners have composter from recycled materials. The door in the composter (barrel) provides easy access to add/remove material.
