The next VCE-MG Training Class starts Jan. 10^{th,} 2011. We have moved the classroom location to the James City Williamsburg Community Center, aka "The Rec Center" on Longhill Road. Our classes are scheduled on Mondays and Wednesdays, so you may see some of our trainees at our Thursday MG monthly meetings in February and March. Our last day of classroom training is April 4th. At the April 7th monthly meeting, we will present our new interns to the membership.

We have 29 students in the training program -24 new trainees, 2 former Master Gardeners taking required classes for reinstatement, and 3 employees from various Ace Hardware stores on the Peninsula. Peg plans to have a special Help Desk training session for the mentors so that they will have current information about the computer system, procedures, location of forms, recommended resources books and on-line VT pest management guide.

Peg and Mary Liz will be working closely with each other and with us to help provide support to the students at each phase of their training -classroom program and internship,

FALL GARDENING

Who knew? Not me, not until our Plant Sale Chairman suggested fall potting parties, and I began to participate. Yearround gardeners also educated me, showing me plants that are forming vigorous rosettes for overwintering.

So I took a closer look at my own small garden, completely neglected since August, and started removing dead vegetation, and thinking about whether I really wanted that plant here, and this plant there. It's easy to dig and move and re-design when the growth is less rampant than in the spring. And while doing so, the extras go into six-inch pots, labeled, to be stored in the backyard until the plant sale.

With our mild late fall/ early winter weather, it's the perfect time to evaluate how the garden appeared in the growing season, and to move and remove where feasible. And this is a good time to dig out the compost which has been fermenting all summer and create new beds.

It's been a lot of fun, and a lot more agreeable to work in 50-60 degree weather than 90-100!
