If the holly had smooth leaves (called a she-holly), the wife commanded the house for the year. If the holly was prickly (a heholly) the husband laid down the law.

## WILDFLOWER OF THE MONTH – JANUARY 2014

# Poverty Oatgrass

Danthonia spicata

Visible even in winter, this clump-forming perennial is distinctive, with wiry tufts of curly, basal leaves and leafless stems. Old basal leaves persist throughout the year, tan-colored, more curved and in-rolled. Blooming in May through August, small flowers develop on stalks 1 foot tall, with 2 short and straight alternate leaves. The leaves of a related species, Silky Oatgrass (*D. sericea*) are taller and parts of the plant are silky-hairy.

Often seen in pathways, Poverty Oatgrass prefers dry, stony soils in sun or light shade. The grass is widespread in Virginia and the U.S. and Canada. Silky Oatgrass grows in dry sandy soil and pine woods, chiefly on the Coastal Plain, extending from southern New Jersey to Kentucky, Florida and Louisiana.



The genus was named in 1805 for a French botanist. Because of its dense tufts of curly basal leaves, Poverty Oatgrass is relatively easy to identify, even when it isn't in bloom.

According to the Dec. 18, 2013 issue of Science Daily, researchers from the University of Illinois at Chicago found that woodpeckers find emerald ash borers a handy food source and may slow the spread of this noxious pest, even ultimately controlling it. Their findings are published online in the journal Forest Ecology and Management.
