## INTERNAL EDUCATION

Remember the storm Saturday evening? I was coming across the Chesapeake Bay Bridge from the House and Garden tour on the eastern shore! The bridge is scary enough without the high winds and the threat of a tornado. I had spent the day at Eyre Hall in Cheriton, Virginia. I had read about the site and knew this was a garden I had to see. It is an 18<sup>th</sup> century property that has remained in the stewardship of the same family for 8 generations. The entrance is flanked by 150 year old Crape Myrtles whose trunks were as large as any oak tree that I have seen. Ancient boxwood surrounds the most beautiful English-style mixed borders. The borders followed every landscaping rule we have read about. Tall shrubs and small trees in the back, perennials of every size and shape and color nested in with spring bulbs. An unbelievable array, all bordered by hundreds of white and blue pansies. All of this with not a weed in sight, attended by a gardener whose credentials were that she was a master gardener! Try to see this garden when it is next on tour. You will be inspired.

The Education Committee has been hard at work setting up two field trips. Our first, on May 24 is to Virginia Tech's HRAREC, Hampton Roads Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Virginia Beach. There has been a lot of interest and requests to learn more about rain gardens. Our water stewards have recently been involved in establishing a rain garden at New Quarter Path Park with Dr. Laurie Fox, Research Associate at HRAREC. They feel we would receive a better feel of how to set up a rain garden and see one that has been in place and tested at the VA Beach site. We will also be able to see a buffer zone garden as well as several demonstration gardens. I encourage you to look at their site at [www.arec.vaes.vt.edu/hampton-roads/extension](http://www.arec.vaes.vt.edu/hampton-roads/extension), then **demo gardens** for a preview. This will count as advanced education. We will carpool and you can e-mail me at [dparsons1@cox.net](mailto:dparsons1@cox.net) if you plan on going. I will also bring a sign-up sheet at the monthly meeting.

Secondly, mark your calendars for June 16<sup>th</sup>. We will travel to Suffolk to see the gardens of Linda and Bill Pinkham. The Pinkhams are well known for the beauty and diversity of their acre garden surrounded by woodland and a view of the James River across a flower border and three acres of marshland. The garden was established 12 years ago after they retired from the nursery and landscape business they founded in 1978, Smithfield Gardens in Suffolk, which we will visit after our tour. We will be going during the height of the bloom of the 700 registered daylilies. We will see rock gardens, a formal garden room, an Oriental-

style garden, hot tropical, conifer area and shady woodland gardens not to mention the sculptures created by Bill in his clay studio. This is a garden not to be missed and is regularly on the House and Garden tours. A donation of \$5.00 will be collected for the Norfolk Horticulture Society.

Remember that Saturday, May 7<sup>th</sup> is the 2011 Invasive plant removal day. Let's help our Master Naturalists and the Virginia Native Plant Society by joining our MG, Jeanne Millin at New Quarter Park for a pulling of invasive "Beefsteak Plants" around the baseball area and other spots. There will be a "Walk and Talk" first, looking at natives in the park with Denise Green of Sassafras Farm, as well as the natives planted by the Water Stewards in the Teaching Garden.

Although our area has not yet been directly affected by the Emerald Ash Borer you may be getting questions about it, particularly if you are working on the help desk. If you are interested in more detailed information go to [www.hort.vt.edu/eab](http://www.hort.vt.edu/eab).

Our May speaker is Pam Burton of the Colonial Beekeepers Association. Pam will speak to us about bees, pollination and beekeeping as well as the timely topic of the loss of bee hive population.

Lastly, start thinking about Master Garden College the week of June 22<sup>nd</sup> and International Master Garden College October 10-14. I will send more info as I receive it.

## PENINSULA TREE STEWARDS

Twenty one Master Gardeners recently completed the classroom training required to become Peninsula Tree Stewards and received their Graduation Certificates: three from Gloucester, six from James City County/Williamsburg, six from Hampton, two from Newport News, and four from York County. Doris Heath, VCE Unit Coordinator, made the presentation to the six MG's from JCC/W.

Three separate projects will complete the JCC/W volunteer requirements:

1. An Inventory of the Native Woodlands section of the Williamsburg Botanical Garden,
2. An Inventory of major trees on Duke of Gloucester Street, and
3. An Inventory of major trees along the hiking trail in Ford's Colony.

Other projects from other jurisdictions include:

Assess trees for preservation during parking lot construction of Woodville Park in Gloucester; create a walking tour of St. John's Churchyard in downtown Hampton; create a PowerPoint presentation to teach homeowners about their trees and how to select and care for them (NN); create a class on tree benefits, functions and identification for the Boys and Girls Club of Newport News, 15-20 children in third and fourth grades; and, create a Tree Inventory and Strategic Plan for the Wetlands Area of the York MG Learning Garden.

Each of these projects will result in educating the public on the benefits of trees.



Instruction on use of Tree Field Guides led by Dr. Stewart Ware, Professor Emeritus, W&M, was one of the classes in the 12 week program. Carol King of Hampton coordinated the new class with a committee of one from each jurisdiction. Tod Allen represented JCC/W. Many Tree Stewards helped with preparing and grading tests, recruiting and introducing speakers and the many behind the scene tasks necessary. It was a very successful group effort.

Go to the 5th stoplight after the Coleman Bridge, there will be a Walgreen's on your left, turn left onto Hook Rd. Go to the end of Hook Rd. and turn right onto Hayes Rd. Follow that until you see Abingdon Fire and Rescue on your left. Turn left just after the rescue squad onto Bray Rd. Follow Bray Rd. around a sharp curve to the left, pass two side roads on the right and look for a black mailbox ( # 7029 ) on the right. Come up the gravel drive between the cedars. You'll see the greenhouses.

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## MG LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW

### The Creative Garden: Setting The Stage with Practical and Clever Ideas

This small (40 page) manual was given to the James City County/Williamsburg Master Gardeners by a representative of the National Design Council of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. at our last meeting. It has handy and easy to implement suggestions for putting objects and landscaping ideas into your garden and is one of those books it would be fun to just page through for interesting ideas on disguising garbage cans, creating interesting entrances, fences and gates, paths and walkways, etc. Look it up the next time you are in the library. ### Creating A Deer & Rabbit Proof Garden by Peter Derano

I am finding this book so useful, I ordered one for my own library and one for the Farmers Market, in addition to the one that can be found in the MG library under SB951.D47. This book was first published in 2007 and reprinted in 2009. Plants are listed alphabetically by type (perennials, grasses & ferns, bulbs & tubers, annuals, vines, ground covers and evergreens). On the top of each page are symbols of deer and rabbits indicating whether the plant is resistant to one or both species. There are also lists of resistant plants for sun and shade, and plants which are invasive and which should be avoided. This soft cover book is only 182 pages but the 401 full color photos provide good information for all of us who are looking for a great garden in an area that must be shared with deer and rabbits.
