Pruning

There are two pruning books in the MG Library and one should be on your own home horticultural shelves. The most recent acquisition is the 2005, "<u>The Pruner's Bible: A Step-By-Step Guide to Pruning Every Plant in Your Garden</u>", by Steve Bradley. It is a paper bound book with a good introduction to basic techniques and equipment and then an alphabetical listing of more than 70 of the most common home shrubs and small trees, with a detailed outline of how to do formative, routine and remedial pruning for each variety.

"The American Horticultural Society, 'Pruning and Training: A Fully Illustrated Plant-by-Plant Manual", by Christopher Brickell and David Joyce was printed in 1995 and is a more extensive hardbound book. Many more varieties of ornamental trees, shrubs and climbing plants are covered, with attention paid to the varieties of species, hybrids and cultivars with atypical pruning or training needs. Stop by the MG office and take a look at these books before you go out on your 'Landscape Love' visits and decide if one of them should be in your personal library.

Now that Fall is here, we are separating plants, cleaning up gardens and preparing them for the winter, and thinking about having well deserved time off from the gardens. Soon the holidays will be here which means a whole other type of involvement with plant materials.

To prepare and inspire us, we have invited Hunter Curry, foreman at the Colonial Williamsburg nursery, to our November monthly meeting to show us how to prepare for holiday decorating. Hunter has designed and executed decorations for special events at CW such as, decorations for the Palace garden when Queen Elizabeth visited the area in 2007 and she has created the Christmas decoration at the Wythe house for several years. She will show us examples of the various decorations she has made over the years at the same sites to provide a sense of design options, and she will take us through a demonstration of designing and completing a decoration during our November monthly meeting. In her spare time, Hunter creates floral arrangements for weddings and special events. We look forward to having her with us.

I recently came across information about two books for people with an interest in trees. Forests The American website www.americanforests.org/resources/bigtrees/ displays the National Register of Big Trees, a 48 page colored register that can be downloaded in a pdf format for free or purchased for \$10. You can also download the Big Tree Kids Activity Page from the website for children who are in the 10 yrs. and older age range. The other book I discovered, is Remarkable Trees of Virginia. The Remarkable Trees of Virginia Project was launched in 2004, and has resulted in a book that celebrates some of Virginia's finest trees and a website through which people favorite can nominate their trees www.fw.vt.edu/4h/biatree/ The authors of the book are Nancy Ross Hugo and Dr. Jeffrey Kirwan, project coordinators and photographer Robert Llewellyn. Photographs from the book will be at the Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens from October 18 - November 16. The Remarkable Trees of Virginia Project's website provides information about a 4-H Big Tree Program for children in Virginia from age 9 to 19 years, as well as useful information on identifying and measuring and reporting big trees, and a page on estimated tree life spans. The Virginia Big Tree Database is maintained jointly by the <u>Virginia Forestry Association</u>, the <u>Virginia</u> <u>Department of Forestry</u>, and the <u>Virginia Tech</u>

College of Natural Resources.

On December 4, 2008, our speaker at our monthly meeting will be Bob Goodhart, retired horticulture/landscape professor at CNU. He will teach us about the care and varieties of Camellias.
