GARDEN WOES: ASTER YELLOWS DISEASE

What's wrong with my plant? How many times have you heard this question or been asked it on a Landscape Love visit? Maybe you have even asked yourself that same question. Just as you are admiring all of your beautiful summer flowers, you suddenly spot an unusual flower on one of your garden plants. You notice that the flower appears to be deformed. Is this some strange cultivar with a modified flower? Unfortunately, the answer is no.

What you are seeing is one of the symptoms of Aster Yellows disease caused by an insect vector, the aster leafhopper. Within 10 to 40 days from the time of infection, the plant's leaves will begin to yellow even though the veins of the plant remain green. The growth of the plant will become stunted, the flowers become deformed, the foliage will begin to curl, the flowers may or may not produce seeds, and the leaves of the plant will appear smaller and narrower than normal.

According to the Missouri Botanical Garden, "Aster Yellows is a viral-like disease caused by a phytoplasma (formerly called a mycoplasma-like organism). Insects that suck the sap of plants, especially the aster leafhopper, vector the disease." As the bacteria cells multiply in the infected plants, other leafhoppers pick up the disease in their salivary glands and pass the disease onto healthy plants.

Aster Yellows disease affects over 300 species of plants such as ornamentals, perennials, and vegetables. It is important to note that Aster Yellows disease spreads more quickly during cool wet summers.

Unfortunately, there is no cure for the disease even though it is not always fatal to the plant. The best strategy to keep the disease from spreading is to remove the affected plants from the garden.

One solution for dealing with Aster Yellows disease is to add plants that are less susceptible like geraniums, cockscomb, nicotiana, impatiens, and verbena to the garden. Another strategy is to remove weeds that tend to harbor Aster Yellows disease such as dandelions and plantains from the garden bed. Mesh row covers can also be used to deter leafhoppers and other insects from attacking vegetable plants. It is important to note that the row covers would need to be removed for pollination.

Aster Yellows disease is difficult to control because the insect vector is found in many gardens containing a wide variety of susceptible plants. As you stroll through your gardens, be on the alert for this disease.

Donna Tierney Obituary

Donna Kathryn Tierney died unexpectedly of natural causes, while visiting friends in Boise, Idaho. Born November 1, 1948, Donna was the daughter of a school teacher mother, and Navy Senior Chief father while he was stationed in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She was also the proud daughter of the Ross and Falbo clans of West Virginia. First completing a bachelor's program from Dominion University in 1970, she went on to finish a masters program in business from Salve Regina University in Newport, RI.

Living around the world as the daughter and then spouse of Navy seamen – she ultimately lived in Japan, Italy, California, Rhode Island, New Mexico, Arizona, Tennessee and Florida in addition to several communities in Virginia – her career required her to be resourceful picking up Civil Service opportunities at each new post. Ultimately specializing in logistics planning, program and information management and process engineering, she became at one point a Department Head on the Executive staff of the Naval Sea Systems Command in Washington, D.C. and even turned down an offer to be on the White House Communications Staff to keep her family together. By the time she retired in 2012, Donna was a Navy Senior Subject Matter Experts in Statistical Process Control and organizational management, leaving a huge following of respected senior military leaders.

She married her college boyfriend in 1970, and they spent 52 happy years together. She had one son. In addition to traveling the world and managing a successful career, Donna was a passionate traveler and explorer. She was curious about food, culture, language, people, animals and notably plants. Her love for animals included several Terriers and multiple horses. Over the past 20 years, she regularly rode and trained horses up to this summer. An active member of Master Gardeners in San Diego and Virginia, she successfully managed the Williamsburg annual plant sale in 2021 and 2022 and was selected to be the James City County Williamsburg Master Gardener President starting in January 2023. Her home gardens were also quite spectacular with fruit trees and a greenhouse full of succulents and hydroponics.

Noted for her quick smile and soft voice, Donna always had a caring, responsible personality. She worked hard at trying to do things right and set a good example, encouraging others in whatever organization she was in, toward higher standards. A natural leader, great communicator, teacher and mentor, she lit up a room when she entered.

She is preceded by her mother Libby and father Don. Surviving is husband, Pat, her son, Ryan, her sister Jacque, and a host of close family and friends who will miss her dearly. A memorial service will be held for her at The Settlement at Powhatan Creek Club House on Sunday, September 11, followed by a reception at her home. Friends and relatives are invited. 



How to Get Volunteer Hours

Have you ever wondered how to get volunteer hours? There's a simple 101 to it. First of all, assume *every Project needs help*. Second, well, there is no second – just volunteer to help!

On the Computer:

Log into BetterImpact and locate the **OPPORTUNITIES** tab on the top toolbar next to the **HOME** tab and hit it.



You will see a dropdown for Opportunity Calendar or Opportunity List.



If you hit Opportunity Calendar, you will notice that you may filter an activity (for illustrative purposes, skip this).




Scroll below the filter prompt and you will see the populated calendar or scheduled Projects (these are fixed dates, versus a Project Leader asking for help on

a given day.) Hit and activity and you will find a brief description of the activity and project leader to contact as shown below.



You may reach out to the Project Leaders (phone or email). Confirm if they need volunteers, and inquire about their location, the days they meet and the time. Feel free to ask to be added to their email list (they likely confirm dates, time and accomplishments).


If you would like to go to **List** tab, this will show all the Projects and Activities. You may hit the specific activity to learn about it.




Keep the process simple. Once you are proficient with BetterImpact, play around with the links and dropdowns.

Using the mobile device, follow these steps:

Login to BetterImpact via the app. It will prompt you with a menu.



Hit **Opportunities**, and you will be prompted with the list of activities. You may **filter** activities as you choose, or hit **Search by Day**.



Searching by day tells you what should be available on that day. Any questions, feel free to contact Christine Mason at 757-206-5523.
