Precious Pollinators

October 3, 2024, at 9:00 am in the Williamsburg Regional Library (or via Zoom).

Butterflies and bees are specially designed to pollinate an array of plants. They use a wide variety of strategies to find and collect pollen. Native bees pollinate 70% of all flowering plants and are more efficient than honeybees. Providing habitat for pollinators is essential for our gardens and food production.

Please join us for Adrienne Frank's presentation on Precious Pollinators. Adrienne became a member and Master Naturalist in 2008 with the Historic Rivers Chapter (HRC) of VA Master Naturalists.

She has served on the HRC board in several capacities, including President and Treasurer.

Adrienne is also on the boards of Friends of Dragon Run and the John Clayton Chapter of the Native Plant Society. In 2013, she established a butterfly project for HRC and registered the Williamsburg Butterfly Circle with the North American Butterfly Association (NABA). She coordinates the NABA Count each August. She compiled Butterflies of the Greater Williamsburg Area: An Annotated List of Species.

An Introduction to Rain Gardens

Alexandra Cantwell, from the Norfolk Botanical Garden, will give a presentation on Introduction to Rain Gardens. 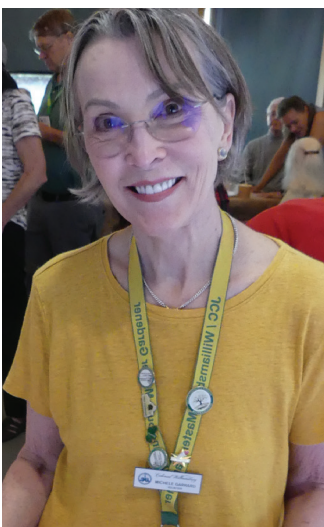

From November 11 to 15, the Brickyard Landing Demonstration Garden will install 120 trees and woody shrubs. We will work two daily shifts: 9 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. We hope that starting on Veterans Day will allow people who might otherwise be at work to help with the planting.

By November, the park will be treated with herbicides to help reduce the weeds in the new garden section. Many of the holes were dug out early in the summer to help loosen the ground for our fall planting. We will still need volunteers to dig, but it should be easier than last November's plantings. We will also need volunteers to plant and mulch around each plant. It will be heavy work, so we are soliciting help from other organizations as well as calling on you, the James City County Williamsburg Master Gardeners.

Also, we plan to seed the meadow in December and plant plugs. We will pick a date in December soon to do the seeding, and we hope to have a number of people to help with this part of the project, which will be fun.

If you have not been to Brickyard Landing Park to see this project, make it a priority to come take a look. We are currently working to weed and mulch the perennial and grass beds. While the Bermuda Grass is a formidable challenge, the garden continues to grow and transform. We hope to see you in November at Brickyard Landing Park, 990 Brickyard Road, Lanexa, Virginia. Changes at the Botanical Garden

Since its beginning in 2005, the Williamsburg Botanical Garden (WBG) has grown and changed a lot. So much so that we have been working to re-furbish some beds over the past two years that aggressive plants have taken over. The structures in the Garden have needed some significant updates as well. As with most garden renovations, there have been ups and downs, but our volunteers have hung in there and are making it happen. If you haven't visited recently, I wanted to highlight selected projects to let you know what we have been working on.

The Flowering Shrub Border along the east side of the fence was replaced with a Fall and Winter Interest Border. The old border had very large plantings that required drastic yearly pruning to keep them out of the paths and some things that were receiving too much sun. The new plantings are shrubs and perennials with interesting flowers, bark, leaves, and stems through the fall and winter months when other garden areas may be winding down for the season. This is the second year of this display, and the plants look great.

Part of the Butterfly Garden was changed to display Native Shrubs for the Home Landscape. These shrubs have the characteristics of the straight species but are more manageable. We hope this will encourage our visitors to plant more native shrubs by giving these beautiful examples that work in an average-sized yard.

The Iris Bed has been changed to a Hummingbird Garden. This garden area accumulates water from runoff from the rest of the garden, and irises were challenging to grow even in a raised bed. The new plantings display easily grown plants by the typical home gardener, guaranteed to attract hummingbirds. We hope to encourage using plants to attract hummingbirds because nectar is more nutritious than sugar water.

The Fairy Garden partially collapsed recently due to some rotting wood. It had been in place for many years, and the Grounds Crew volunteers have removed it so that they may install a completely new structure that will last many more years. This is a very popular area for children as well as adult



visitors, and I'm sure our volunteers will make it better than ever.

There are two pavilions in the garden that have green roofs. The original structure by the main patio was built in 2005. Unfortunately, about half of the original plants on the roof have died, which is not surprising after nearly 20 years. Because of the fairly significant cost of revitalizing the plants, we have not been able to address it until now. We obtained grant money, which should cover refurbishing both roofs over the next few months. We are very excited to show the public how even a small structure, once again with plantings, can support wildlife and is more attractive in a garden than traditional roofing materials.

Our amazing volunteers have cleared several other areas of aggressive plants in the garden, such as obedient plants, daylilies, goldenrods, and

honeysuckles. We have tried some new plantings but have had significant rabbit damage in the past two years. Fencing seems to be the only reliable deterrent, so it has slowed down our new planting schedule.

Through it all, our volunteers have taken on the challenges with humor and perseverance. I cannot thank our volunteers enough for how hard they have worked despite these challenges to improve the display beds, and I know that with patience, we will continue to make progress to restore these areas. 2025 VCE Tree Steward Certification Course

The Peninsula Tree Stewards are organizing a Tree Steward certification class.

WHAT:

This is a 36-class hour certification with a follow-on Tree Steward project that should be completed within 12 months of the class completion. Classes are 3 hours a week, plus reading prep. The optimum participation is in person every session, but planning will include remote access and self-paced catch-up.

WHO:

Any Master Gardener who has completed the Master Gardener course and their 50 hours of project time.

WHEN:

We are planning a start on Jan 8, 2025, followed by weekly sessions on Wednesday mornings. Graduation is projected on/about March 26, 2025. Classes will be mainly in person and LIVE on ZOOM. All classes will be recorded for viewing at your convenience.

WHERE:

Class locations are planned for central Newport News, Williamsburg, York, and possibly Hampton.

HOW:

Applications will be available in early October. VCE agent Luke Gladden must approve these as part of the application process. The cut-off for applications will be in mid-November.

COST:

The estimate now is around \$75, covering speaker gifts, refreshments, and several resource books for class participants. The basic textbook is available for free download or can be purchased in print; the cost is to be determined.

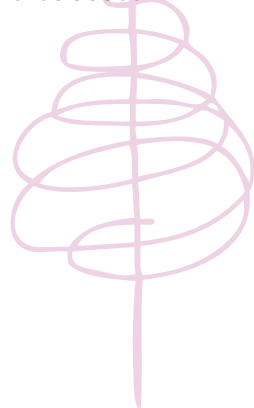
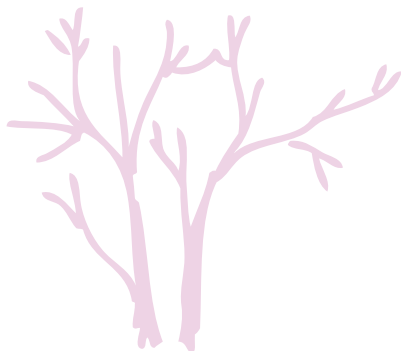
